

Engaging Faculty and Staff in Safety Drills

"Rapid response by the school administration and staff to an emergency situation can prevent injuries, save lives and allow for a more rapid return to normal school operations."

Faculty and Staff can help mitigate the impact of a crisis by considering the following –

- ✓ Participate in the training, drills and debriefings -
 - O Take an active role as a member of the Building Level Safety Team.
- ✓ Promote emergency preparedness as a high priority within the classroom and equal in importance to increasing academic achievement.
- ✓ Lead by example
 - o Be calm.
 - Reassuring.
 - o Affirming.
- ✓ Correctly instruct students on how they are expected to respond
 - o Proper staff and student response can help with classroom management and crisis mitigation.
 - O Drills are intended to train students as much as staff.
- ✓ Communicate with your students. Answer any questions regarding drills and training -
 - O Why do we have these?
 - O How do we know if we are safe?
 - O What do we do if....?
- ✓ Prepare your classroom/work area in advance −
 - o Make sure your Questar III Classroom Emergency Guide is in place.
 - Review the protocols with staff and students throughout the year.
 - Optimize the classroom layout for safety
 - Reorganize classroom furniture.
 - Add or move partitions/bookcases for added visual protection to safe areas
 - Mark the floor to demarcate optimal safe areas
 - Plan for long duration events -
 - Consider student/staff medical needs.
 - Prepare age appropriate items for students to keep them quiet and occupied.
 - Consider restroom needs.
- ✓ Recognize the unique characteristics of the school building, school grounds, students and families.
- ✓ Understand the key components and critical activities of the four phases of emergency management—prevention/mitigation, preparedness, response, and recovery.
- ✓ Become familiar with the Incident Command System; managing any crisis or emergency should be done following the ICS principles.
- ✓ Work with and learn from community/school partners; build from their expertise and collaborative knowledge to be better prepared for emergencies.
- ✓ Provide feedback to administrators which will aid in local decision-making and plan improvements.
